A. and T. College and A. and M. College, Orangeburg, South Carolina, will meet in a triangular debate in Greensboro, Friday, April 20, discussing the question: "Resolved, that the U. S. Government should establish a Department of Education with a Secretary in the President's Cabinet." The local teams, coached by Professor Mortimer Weaver, are composed of H. B. Chandler, C. Williams, W. E. Pitts, M. E. Patterson, O. N. Whitfield, and W. H. Whitted. One team will defend the affirmative at home, while the other will journey to Virginia to debate Virginia State College. The second which wins both sides of the debate will come into possession of a large silver trophy, emblematic of the colored debating championship of North Carolina, South Carolina and Virginia.

ANNUAL DEBATING CONTEST TO BE HELD APRIL 20th. The Seventh Annual Debating Contest of the Virginia-Carolina Triangular Debating League is announced for Friday evening, April 20, 8:00. Contests will be held simultaneously at Orangeburg, S. C., Petersburg, Va., and Greensboro, N. C., the contestants being the Land Grant Colleges located in these places. Each school will defend the affirmative side of the question at home against a visiting team from one of the members whose team will defend the negative. The subject for this year is: "Resolved, That the United States should establish a Department of Education with a Secretary in the President's Cabinet."

By the authorization of the State A. and M. College at Orangeburg, S. C., Messrs. Timothy Stewart, Sidney Williams and Wade Witherspoon, Atlanta, will battle against Messrs. W. E. Pitts, M. E. Patterson and W. H. Whitted, Atlanta, representing the A. and T. College of Greensboro, N. C. All are experienced debaters and this promises to be a spirited contest. South Carolina will be represented at Petersburg, Va., by Miss Carrie Mae Spauld, Dr. Orleans Reid and Miss Katie Kelley, Atlanta. The S. C. team defeated Virginia at Orangeburg last year and the contest is expected to be close at Virginia.

The coaches of the teams in the league are Professor A. H. Gordon for South Carolina; Professor Mortimer Weaver for North Carolina, and Professor T. D. Pawley for Virginia. The hosts in the debate at Orangeburg will be President D. H. Sims of Allen University, Dean E. D. Redfern of Guilford College, and Principal J. E. Nelson of Voorhees Institute.
