Florida sends the greatest number of out-of-state students to South Carolina State College. 25 students from that State being registered with Georgia pushing a close second with 16. From other states the registration is as follows: Oklahoma, 1, Mississippi 1; New York 6, Connecticut 2, Illinois 1, North Carolina 7, Michigan 1, Alabama 3, New Jersey 2, Pennsylvania 1, Ohio 2, Tennessee 1, and Virginia 1.
