There are only two schools in Union County that run nine months, they are Sims Hill and the school at Lockhart. We complain of these short terms, yet so many of our people will not send their children regularly, it is the reason why they are short. If you could get the colored man to send his children regular those 4 months and when the term is not, raise money to pay the teacher and let the school run two or three months longer.

It is strange how people will do. Ask a man for money for education and the church and he will declare that he is not able to give that same man will buy a car.
