"For Necessity Is Laid Upon Me"

1 Cor. 9:16

Much is being said here of late about unprepared pulpits and that this latter day ministry ceases to be an attractive field for highly educated men. It is also said that because of the poor salaries paid in the ministry the prepared man chooses other professions and only the illiterate and untrained compose the majority of applicants for the ministry. This argument is usually indulged by laymen who are real educators. And when I say they are truly educated I say what I mean. For when it comes to literary attainments the laymen must be reckoned with the world over. In fact the government and the church have made greater provisions for the training of the laity than they have for the ministry. Hence the greatest number of scholars from a secular viewpoint are to be found in the pews. The laity has produced our best orators from the days of Cicero and Demosthenes. Our greatest editors in this country are laymen. They are the most fearless writers. But when these laywriters undertake the liberty of telling the church that intelligence has no inducement to enter its pulpits they are attempting to discuss a subject of which they know nothing about. When they assume the position to say who are the proper persons to enter God's ministry they are meddling with that which is none of their business. In the place the ministry is not a profession in which men make choice. It is a divine calling. God does the choosing and not the individual. And God seeth not as man seeth. For one looketh on the outward appearance and the other looketh on the heart. Too many have come to the ministry looking upon it as any other profession of mere choice. But God calls men to preach the gospel and most assuredly He knows who are qualified to perform the task. The class of men that the world clamors for, Christ cannot use. He wants those that will "lift Him up" and not themselves for it is He that must draw all men unto him. When God wanted a man to stand before scientists and philosophers in classic Athens He called Saul of Tarsus and he obeyed giving up his well paid position as a government officer for a ministry with no salary. He said in words of our text "for necessity is laid upon me; yet woe as unto me, if I preach not the gospel." This injunction is why the God called men preach the gospel and cannot refuse. Nearly all of the God called prepared ministers could make more money had they accepted other professions, but necessity was laid upon them. Cases can be cited where men have actually turned down positions paying them two thousand dollars in other professions and accepted charges in the ministry that paid them much less. They were simply God-called men. And fact such is the "woe is unto me if I preach not the gospel." The laymen need not be the least bit attached about educated men not seeking the ministry. God will send forth those whom He needs. And unless they are divinely called to preach the gospel they should not attempt because of their high learning. Then too, any man that God calls to preach the gospel will preach it. Like Jonah many have tried to evade it but finally they had to obey God. Hear me if chopping blocks and crosses of crucifixion, horns, den and burrows fire could not frighten the God sent prophets and apostles in other days, small salaries and privations will not stop the God called ministry now from proclaiming the good news of the Kingdom.
