SERVES STRATEGIC PURPOSE IN "LAUGHING SINNERS," SAYS HARRY BEAUMONT

Is the theme song dead? Harry Beaumont, who directed the first musical film, "The Broadway Melody," doesn't think so. And to back up his contention, Beaumont introduces a new singer in "Laughing Sinners," Joan Crawford's new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer starring vehicle which will come to the Capitol Theatre.

"Any song that serves a useful purpose in a picture is welcome," declared Beaumont in discussing the use of music in talkie productions. "If the song is part of the story development it is vital and belongs just as much as a part of important dialogue. Nothing can so impress a sentiment upon an audience as an appropriate song."

"Our Blushing Brides" brought forth a costume that became suddenly diaphanous during her dance number, and in "Dance, Fools, Dance" Joan wore a mirrored costume that lost its skirt as the jazz saxophones blared the mad rhythm.

Now in "Laughing Sinners," her new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer starring vehicle playing at the Capitol Theatre, Joan dances in a farmer's over-all outfit that loses its legs, leaving America's Dancing Daughter as you like to see her.
