The reason why such a shortage in church financies, is because so many people refuse, to pay any thing to the church because they cannot make the money they made in days past. Others wait to see what they can spare the church out of the little they are making now So you can readily see that the church gets nothing. Regardless of the small amounts the people are receiving they owe the church a part of that.
