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MINISTERS CONFERENCE AT BENEDICT COLLEGE JULY 1st THROUGH 5th

"The Pastor As Priest" Theme Of Fifth Ministers Institute of South Carolina

Benedict College, Columbia, S. C., June 20. The fifth Annual National Ministers' Institute for the State of South Carolina will be held at Benedict College, July 1-5. This year's Institute will aim to meet the needs of the city and rural pastor, with its theme, "The Pastor as Priest." Regular classroom work will be in the hands of Dr. J. E. Briggis, A. B., A. M., D. D., and the Rev. Charles H. Brown, A. B., B. D., S. T. M., of the department of Religion at Benedict College. The following courses, with Texas will be offered: Effective Religious Education; Dillingham's "A New Program for Church School"; New Testament; Curry's Jesus and His Cause; Bible History; Pastoral Psychology and Psychology; Winslow and Hahn's New Healthy Living. There will also be other important lectures at the daily worship hour and at evening service. A pastor's conference will be held each afternoon dealing with a pastor's problems. The College invites all preachers in South Carolina regardless of denominational connections to attend these meetings, they are for your benefit, and introduce those who will become members of the winter study groups to the work they are to do this winter leading to graduation certificates that will be given when four Summer Institutes and the Winter courses are had. All men who have attended previous sessions are urged to be present. The cost is little, board can be had for the week on the campus for \$3.00, books will cost no more than \$3.00, while one dollar will register you. Arrange a party of preachers from your community to come by auto to cut out transportation expenses.
