STATE ANNUAL METHODIST CONFERENCE NOV. 26 TO DECEMBER 1

Orangeburg, S. C., Nov. 25th - Plans for the epoch making session of the South Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church which will be held with Trinity M. E. Church, Orangeburg November 26 to December 1, 1935 inclusive have been completed.

Momentous questions of church policy and approval or disapproval of the merger plan for union of Methodism will be upmost discussions at this session which precedes the general conference that will be held next Summer.

Reverend M. McCollum who is completing his first year as pastor of Trinity M. E. Church is the entertaining pastor. Reverend S. A. Funches, District Superintendent of the Orangeburg district is assisting the Reverend Frederick T. Keeney, Bishop of the Atlantic area, of which this conference is a part, is the presiding bishop.
