

"THE OLD GRAY" AND "THE NEW RIDER"

Long before the hour appointed for the closing service of the A. M. E. Conference at St. George last Sunday morning, Betha's church auditorium was crowded to its capacity with hundreds standing on the outside. Rev. J. E. Thomas, D. And if the books of biography in the New Testament written by Matthew, Mark, Luke and John were destroyed, all of them could be reproduced from the book of the prophet, Isaiah. His prophecies were a serious indictment against the chosen people, and he himself was solely effected by the impending doom that awaited him, and those of whom he was identified. No man in slave could speak so accurately. The book contains a serious accusation followed by words of consolation. Speaking of Israel as an individual the prophet said the whole head is sick, and the whole heart is faint. From the sores of the feet even unto the head there is no soundness in it. Bores, wounds, and bruises and putrifying sores. But in the fourth chapter of the book he was commanded to comfort the people. After giving a beautiful description of the high priest in the text, the bishop appealed to the ministers in his conclusion to walk upon it, if they would succeed on their charge this conference year.
