worked out in the small hours. He gets his pay from the African Methodist Church, but the metropolitan East is swiftly losing sight of his denominational allegiance. In Philadelphia and New York, in Washington and Boston, alike, David Henry Sims, of Georgia and South Carolina is a minister turned-college-president-turned-bishop; but, above all a man whose feet have remained

closely entwined with the turned soil and the people whose feet walk that way.

His message, however, was in keeping with the tenets of the organization under whose auspices he spoke; for the unique Young People's Interracial Fellowship, headed by James Dumpson, a Cheney graduate, and Marjorie Penney, a young white religious social worker, has taken its bold stand. It has raised money for the sharecroppers, fought for the Equal Rights Bill, championed a Christianity bigger than race and stretched its elastic limit for the eventual passage of an anti-lynching bill.

And last Sunday it brought forth David Henry Sims, who, despite the academic robes he wore in regal splendor, dusted off Chris-
