

Lunceford a "Killer" In College

When Jimmie Lunceford's Orchestra brings the School of Jazz-nocracy to Columbia on March 17 at the Auditorium, he will be accompanied by a set of rhythm masters who have been acclaimed favorites on campuses from "border to border and coast to coast." Further than that, he even drew raves after playing a hop at the University in Oslo, Norway. Arne var Erpekum Sem wrote in the Tidens Tegn next day: "Such a show, such a playing and such fun there has never been in the University Hall before!"

At Williams, Duke, Northwestern, the University of Chicago, Cornell, the University of Texas, Harvard and the rest of the almost unending list of colleges Lunceford has played, he draws ecstatic comment from the campus scribes who go to watch and report. That is why he drops his New York night club engagements and his radio programs at the beginning of each year to play Junior Proms—and he plays more Junior Proms than any other band leader in America. His style of rhythm and music is guaranteed to break up that never-ending poker game in the fraternity houses and to draw even the most associal "goon" in any sorority out for an evening of jive.

True to its tag, "School of Jazz-nocracy," ten of the men in Lunceford's band are college graduates, with degrees ranging from Bachelor of Arts all the way up to Trumpeteer, Eddie Tompkins, degree of Doctor of Medicine. And in keeping with the band's record Jimmie's wife, Crystal, is working on a Master's degree in education and majoring in Psychology at Columbia University.

The band was formed while Jimmie was studying at Fisk University. No doubt that is the reason his swiny music has never lost the flavor of the ultimate in campus sophistication.

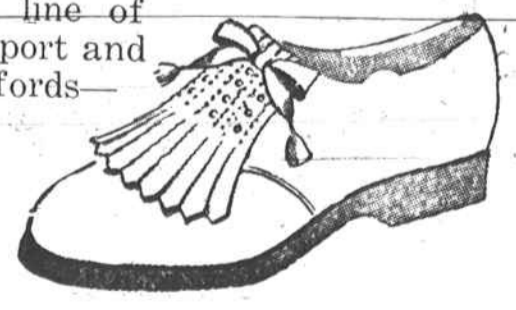
