

'State' Wins Post-Season Tilt

Orangeburg, S. C.—Long inflections from sturdy hands of Odell Gillion to two racy leaping ends, William DeLaine and Columbus Stanley, gave South Carolina State A. and M. a much desired post season victory of 21-7 against Alcorn A. and M., Alcorn, Mississippi Braves.

The Bulldogs had to overcome an early touchdown lead that was made by Nero. Alcorn scored or the starting eleven whose bad cases of nerves resulted in four fumbles. Substitution of the first string eleven included the Gillion-DeLaine passing combination stopped the high-spirited Braves of Alcorn.

The Gillon-DeLaine combination scored a touchdown and took extra point from passes to tie the Alcorn lead 7-7, soon after their arrival in the game.

In the third quarter passing attack Gillion and DeLaine again accounted for a second South Carolina State touchdown and a Gillon to Martin for the second extra point.

State's final touchdown came in the middle of the fourth quarter when Gillion heaved a 40 yard pass over the goal line into the arms of Columbus Stanley. Gillion made it a perfect score by again tossing the extra point into the arms of Martin.

Alcorn was unable to overcome this 21-7 lead, with the fine ground gaining of their four horsemen.

For Alcorn, Porter was a powerful line driving back and Lamar Lenior a long ground gainer broken field runner. Miller, right end, was a power on defense.

Xmas Workers Security Cards Need Social

Workers who are employed temporarily for the Christmas holidays should secure Social Security account number cards, according to Mr. W. H. Nixon, Jr., manager of the Social Security Board office in Columbia.

This number should be shown to the employer for whom the person works. All employers having as many as one person working for them are required to report to the Bureau of Internal Revenue the name of that person, his Social Security account number and the amount of wages paid.

An important change in the method of issuing Social Security account number cards is being made throughout the entire country, according to Mr. Nixon. When an employee now files an application for an account number and there is some question as to whether the applicant has previously had an account number card, the applicant will be given a temporary receipt without a number entitled "Evidence of Application Number" for use while his application for an account number is being checked against the nation's files.

Mr. Nixon advises employees that when an employee offers a temporary receipt in lieu of a Social Security account number, to make a record of the employee's name and address, date of issue of the receipt, termination date, and the address of the field office which issued it. All of this information appears on the temporary receipt. Employees should inform those for whom they work the correct Social Security account number as soon as it is received.

If the worker fails to notify the employer of his account number before leaving his job, the employer may obtain the correct account number for the purpose of including it on his tax return. Form SS-1a, by communication with the field office which issued the temporary receipt. Do not ask the field office to supply the account number until fifteen days after the date of issue of the temporary receipt. Give the full name and address of the employee, the date of issue of the temporary receipt and the termination date appearing thereon.

The Social Security Board has just issued a booklet entitled "Your Social Security Number Card" which explains the purpose of the worker's social security card. A copy of this booklet will be mailed upon request free-of-charge by addressing a letter or postcard to the Social Security Board, Palmetto State Life Building, Columbia, S. C., and asking for Circular No. 44.
