Clinton College Head JAPAN ATTACKS U.S. AND BRITAIN POSSESSIONS IN PACIFIC SUNDAY

Japan assaulted every main United States and British possess ion in the central and western Pacific and invaded Thailand today (Monday) in a hasty but evidently shrewdly planned prosecution of a war she began Sunday

ichout warning.

Her formal declaration of war against both the United States and Britain came two hours and 55 minutes after Japanese planes spread death and terrific destruction in Honolulu and Pearl Har bor at 7:35 a.m., Hawaiian time (1:05-p.m., EST) Sunday.

President Roosevelt in his Tues lay night net work radio address icclared that powerful and resourceful gangsters have banded ogether to make war upon the whole human race. The President further said: "We are now in this war, we are all in it, but we are going to win. Every single man, woman and child is a partner in the most tremen us indertaking of American history. We must share together the bad news and its good news, the deeats and the victories-the chang d fortunes of our war". Thus spoke our great President after he Japanese had bombed 3000 or nore of our soldiers without proocation or warning in the Pac spreading destruction and leath in Honolulu and Pearl Har-
