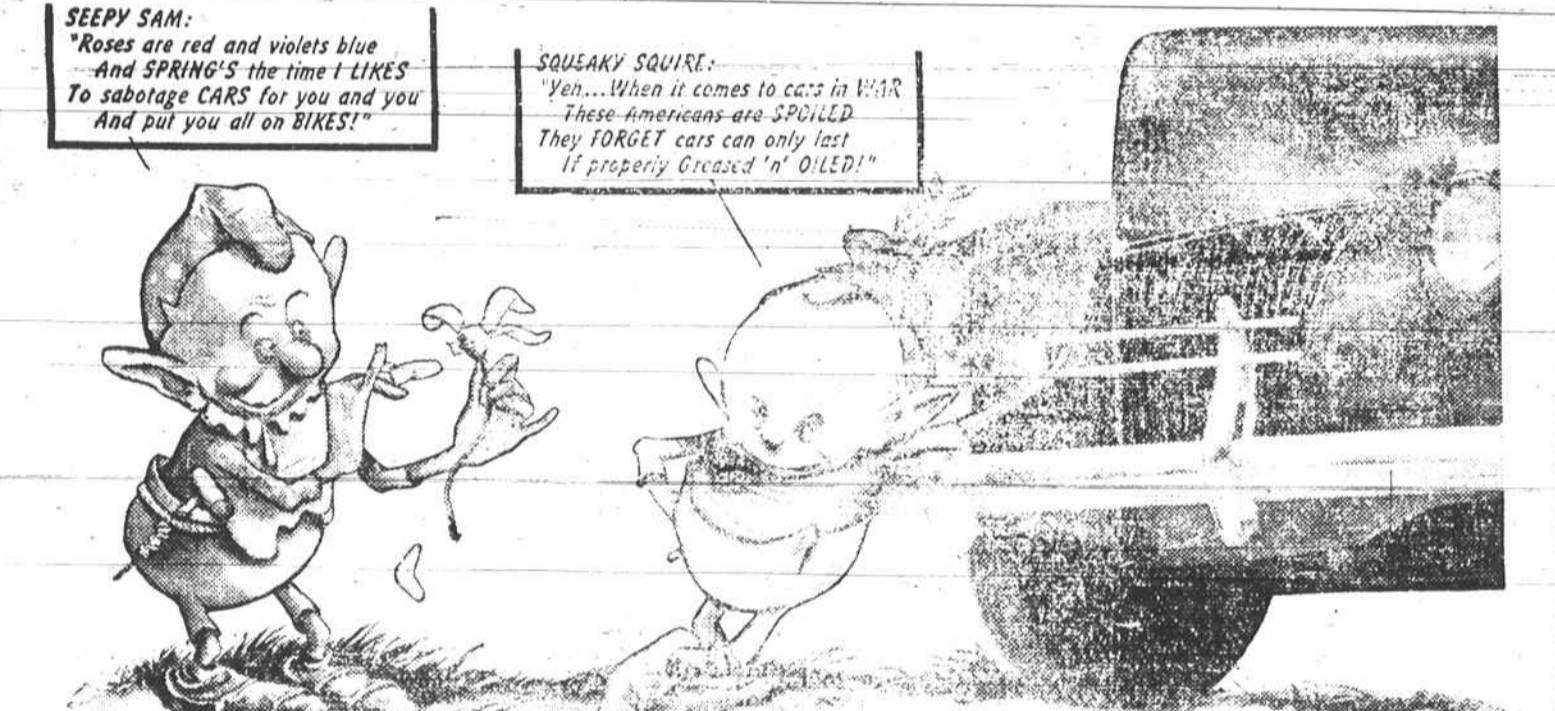
Mrs. Grant was a resident of Columbia for many years. She was born in Virginia and came to Columbia in 1880.
