BAKED PEANUTS
(A Meat-Alternate)
1 lb. unshelled peanuts
1 can No. 2 1-2 tomatoes
1 onion
2 tablespoons molasses
2 tablespoons brown sugar
1-4 teaspoon dry mustard
1-2 teaspoon black pepper
1 teaspoon chili pepper
2 tablespoons chili sauce or tomato paste
Soak peanuts overnight in water to cover. Boil gently in the same water for an hour and a half or until tender. There should be very little water left. Combine all the ingredients and add to the boiled peanuts. Place in a baking dish and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F) for about two hours or until sauce is thick. Serve right.
