The Quadrennial Primary Meeting

The Quadrennial Primary of the Seventh Episcopal District was held in Manning, in Trinity A.M.E. church, Nov. 26, 1943, at 2 o'clock. The meeting was presided over by our beloved Bishop T. S. Flipper, the great Senior Bishop of the A. M. E. Church. He presided over the meeting with impartiality, grace and dignity. He gave every man who wanted a chance to express himself. After hearing them he interpreted the laws of the A.M.E. Church. He gave information and fatherly counsel during the whole session, and every man justice.

After a few remarks by the candidates for the Bishopric, Dr. T. J. Miles and R. E. Brozdon and others, the meeting proceeded with its business. The following persons were elected for the Episcopal Committee of the ensuing General Conference: Dr. H. W. Walker and Dr. L. D. King, ministers; Prof. C. G. Garrett and Mr. N. P. Grant, laymen.

Dr. J. E. Thomas was elected State Chairman. Dr. Thomas proved himself worthy of this position four years ago from every angle. He is a scholar, profound thinker and a great preacher. Dr. E. A. Parker was elected State Secretary. Dr. Parker is one of the most progressive presiding elders in the Church. He is also a great lawyer.

Dr. T. J. Miles was endorsed by the Seventh Episcopal District for the Bishopric. Dr. Miles is worthy of this exalted position. He is a great preacher and one of the leading presiding elders in the A. M. E. Church. He was presiding for over twenty years. He knows how to treat men. He carries on his district with great success, not with a big stick over his men; but with brotherly love to all he has done his work well as a great pastor and as a great presiding elder. He is the Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Trustee Board of Allen University.

Two important resolutions were read by Dr. J. E. Thomas and the writer, and adopted unanimously in the meeting. One asking for the return of Bishop Flipper from the ensuing General Conference that will be held next May in Philadelphia back to the State. I feel that this is one time when every delegate, minister and layman should unite their forces together and go to this General Conference in one accord and work for the good of the A.M.E. Church in South Carolina and help elect this man of God, Dr. Miles to the Bishopric and bring Bishop Flipper back to the State for the good of the Church and for a great school—Allen University. Together we stand, but divided we fall.

Darlington—Bishop Lorenzo H. King, Atlantic coast area, central jurisdiction, closed his quadrennial of an epochal session of the South Carolina conference Methodist church, Rev. D. E. Thomas, entertaining pastor, Sunday afternoon with the reading of appointments for 214 churches in nine districts of conference.

Delegates to the general and jurisdictional conferences, prominent visiting church leaders, and all sheets of the conference activities were highlights of the epochal 18th annual session of this Methodist group. Ordination of 13 deacons and 11 elders Sunday morning was the preliminary service that preceded the reading of appointments by the Bishop, L. H. King at the close of the four-day session.

Board representatives who spoke at the conference included Edgar A. Love, church extension; R. N. Brooks, Christian Advocate central edition; A. P. Howard, board of temperance; H. J. Crolley, pension and relief; Professor Touchette, board of lay activities, and Phyllis M. Gibbs, Women Society for Christian Service.

Reports by the annual conference officers and committee chairman showed gains along all lines. Rev. J. A. Summers, Orangeburg, reported increase in church membership. Rev. George A. Thomas, annual conference treasurer reported that \$42,890 had passed through his hands during the year of World Service and benevolences.

Rev. H. H. Cooper, Kingstree, S. C., chairman World service and finance made a request for additional contributions for 1943-44 which was approved. Rev. M. J. Porter, Lamar, announced in his treasury report of the Board of conference claimants, that \$4564, has been disbursed among retired ministers or the S. C. Conference and \$1754 raised for the ministers wives allowance.

The Gold Seal Pension rally, a project inaugurated by Bishop King at the beginning of the quadrennial, went over the top with a \$52,110. All of this fund is disbursed to retired ministers of the South Carolina Conference.

DEBT In 1921 the members of Bethel Baptist Church of Gaffney, S. C. took upon their shoulders the building of a \$47,000 pressed-brick church. When the building was completed, a heating plant and modern pews were installed. About five years ago a new heating plant was installed in order that the church be properly heated. This plant cost \$850.
