SOUTH CAROLINIAN RECEIVES SCHOLARSHIPS TO HARVARD



Benjamin F. Payton, young Baptist Minister of Orangeburg, South Carolina and son of the Reverend L. R. Payton, has recently been granted Scholarships in sufficient amount to resolve all of the expenses of graduate work in Theology at Harvard University.

He has been awarded a \$600 Scholarship by the Harvard Divinity School and he has received a \$1200 stipend from the Danforth Foundation.

These awards were made on the basis of the superior scholarship and leadership abilities that he has exemplified as an undergraduate student at South Carolina State College; also, in recognition of the christian perspective that he has attained and put to work in his many endeavors.

He received the Bachelor of Arts degree from South Carolina State College on May 30, 1955. While a student at State College, he served in the dual capacity of student leader and Minister.

Among the visitors at Trinity were Prof. Scott and supervisor of Santee Schools, Prof. Johnson, one of Santee's best principals, the principal of Manning Training High school, all made remarks.

His other college activities include: membership in Alpha Kappa Mu Honor Society, the Debating Society, the Baptist Student Union and the Henderson-Davis Players Guild.

During his sophomore year he received the Men's Congress MOST WORTHY MALE STUDENT AWARD; in his junior year he received the Henderson-Davis Players Cup as the Best Actor of the year and was voted the Most religious and the Most Scholarly Male Student on the campus.

During his Senior year he was selected to appear in the 1954-55 edition of WHO'S WHO IN AMERICAN UNIVERSITIES AND COLLEGES and he received the American Legion Medal for his outstanding achievements.

The Scholarship he received to Harvard will be renewed annually, pending successful matriculation. The Danforth Award is particularly interesting in that he was one of three American Negroes who received the 1955 award. A total of fifty-eight fellowships were given to those chosen from approximately 500 applicants from American universities and colleges all over the nation.

The Danforth Foundation's program is largely one of encouragement to enable their Fellows to work towards the doctoral degree and put their talents to work in higher Christian education.

Prior to entering Harvard on September 22nd, Mr. Payton will attend a six-day conference at Camp Miniwauca, Michigan. His expenses will be paid by the Danforth Foundation.

Payton has achieved quite a reputation for his potency as a preacher of the Christian Gospel. While working in Atlantic City, N. J. the past two summers, his services were much in demand in the churches of the various denominations of that city. His experiences included that of speaking in a White Presbyterian Church.

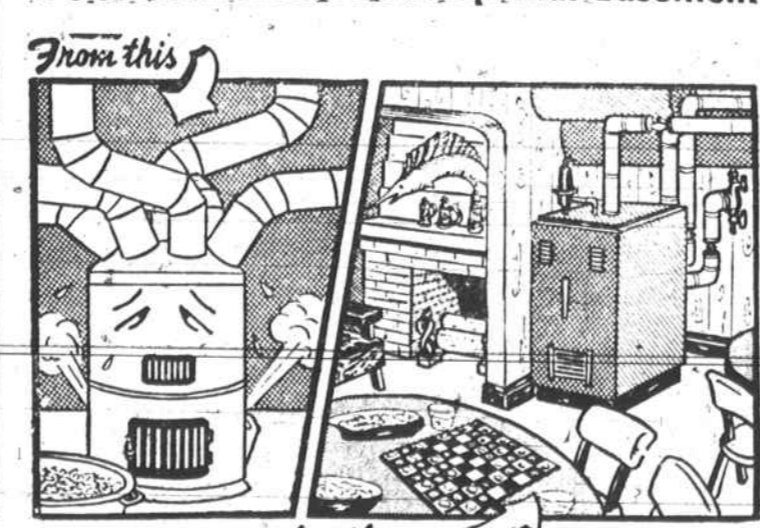

White scours is the most notorious calf-killer in the country. Quick and deadly, the disease causes heavy losses in newborn stock wherever it strikes.

The infected calf is usually short-lived, suffering from fever, listlessness, white, watery diarrhea, and rapid breathing within hours of its birth... and dying soon after.

A less serious condition, common scours, shows similar symptoms in calves of all ages, and may lead to other more dangerous diseases.

Most calves receiving a terramycin tablet a few hours after birth were protected from the disease. Nearly every animal already infected recovered when one tablet a day was used.

Veterinarian Hellmut Kafka reported that on one farm where eight newborn calves had just died from white scours, fifteen infected calves recovered in a few hours after terramycin treatment.
