## USO Pal Day Celebration

November 13 and 16, 1955

The fourth annual celebration of USO Pal Day will begin in Columbia on Sunday, November 13. No one event so typifies USO, or better demonstrates its aims than USO Pal Day. The purpose of the celebration, which was inaugurated in 1952 as an annual observance, is to strengthen the bond of friendship and common purpose between the American people and their armed forces.

Home hospitality, which seems particularly applicable to USO-Pal Day, is being arranged for 250 servicemen by the Taylor Street Club and at least 350 service personnel by the Laurel Street USO. Men will be registered in the respective clubs.

It is hoped that many citizens of Columbia will participate in this fourth annual celebration of USO Pal Day. Mr. John Whitteman, Chairman of the Taylor Street USO Operating Committee, asks that all interested members of local churches register with their ministers.

PRESIDENT TUBMAN, NOT SIMPSON, ISSUED BLAST AT GUNTHER

CHICAGO — (ANP) — The Associated Negro Press last week, in releasing a story, the severe criticism of John Gunther for the Liberian chapter in his "Inside Africa," attributed the remarks to Liberian Ambassador C. L. Simpson.

ANP, however, erred. The criticism was made in a statement by Liberia's President William V. S. Tubman.

The statement was released to ANP through the Liberian embassy in Washington. President Tubman blasted Gunther's "unrestrained flimflam" toward the African republic.
