Shivarm, the famous temple dancer of India now on his second transcontinental highly successful USA tour, began his training at six years of age-an extraordinary and exacting, rigorous 12-year apprenticeship required of all KATHAKALI temple dancers.

Every morning at 4:00 a. m. during the six months rainy season, he rose and sat in the dark facing the bright glare on an oil lamp. Then for two solid hours he exercised his eyes, lubrication them inside with clarified butter, rolling them, controlling them, darting them this way and that, and swinging them in figures of eight.

Learning to be a temple dancer was a 14 hour a day business, including the 700 symbolic gestures (each accompanied by special facial-expression) complicated "dram-language," the meaning of Sanskrit songs for the 110 all night Sanskrit dance dreams, and the roles of all the characters in all the e s e

Health For All

Savengali, M. D. It has taken centuries for hypnosis to come out of the shadows and become a respectable medical technique. Until recently it was looked upon as an unholy device used by charlatans to trick the innocent.

Hypnosis is still very much on trial as a technique of medicine, but it has shown good results in certain types of illness. Recently doctors reported amazing success with patients suffering from severe burns.

Hypnotic treatment was almost too successful in some cases. One patient, who had not been able to exercise his burned hands because of the pain, under hypnotic suggestion did his exercises constantly even while he slept.

It took skilled medical specialists about an hour and a half to put a patient into his first hypnotic trance. After that, the suggestions were repeated daily in trances which took only minutes. Within a few days, the suggestions made during the trances began to take hold. The hypnotized patients developed enormous appetites and their feelings of pain were lessened. Some patients, however, were resistant to hypnotic suggestion, and so could not be helped at all by this technique.

Obviously, hypnosis isn't going to be a miracle cure-all, and it can be dangerous in inexperienced hands. But it may become an important weapon of medical science in its fight to restore the sick and injured to health.
