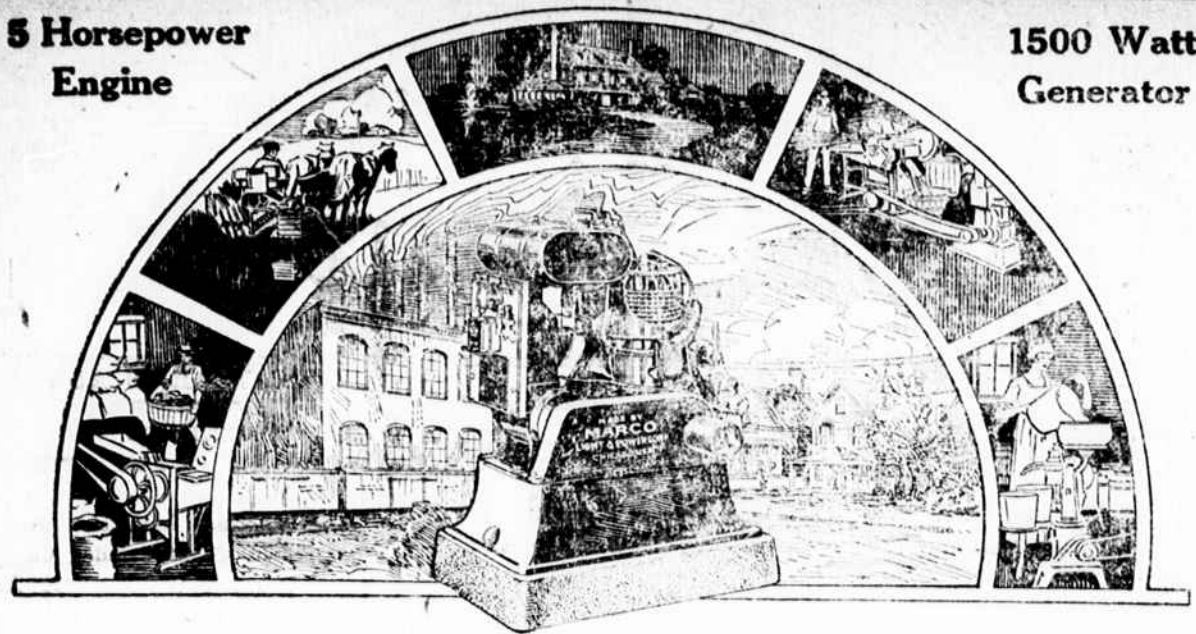

### ADVICE TO COTTON FARMERS

Agricultural Commissioner Brown, of Georgia, advises cotton farmers not to be in haste selling cotton. He estimates that it is all right to let the gamblers and speculators sell all the imaginary cotton they desire, but when they have sold millions of bales more than the South can produce then let the cotton farmers put on a holding movement that will break and bankrupt forever the greedy speculators and teach the world a lesson that board contracts and gambling slips of paper cannot be spun into cotton fabrics.

Mr. Brown also calls on the federal reserve bank to extend loans on bonded warehouse receipts at 6 per cent, so as to assist the producers in obtaining a fair price for their staple.

A dispatch from Chicago says there is a plan on foot in that city to park autos in the subway, in other words to put the cars under ground. The autos have put a great many people under ground. Turn about is fair play.

### JAMES M. COX NOT AN ANTI

Although Mr. Cox stated very plainly and positively that he favored the enforcement of all laws, an effort has been made to induce the belief that Cox is a wet candidate and not favorable to prohibition.

The Chairman of the Democratic National Committee has sent out this statement:

"The democratic party is not going to lose its campaign on a 'beer and light wine' policy. It will stand squarely on the national platform and for its enforcement. The wet can interpret this platform any way they choose."

Eleanor Glenn writes in the New York Times Book Review a story headed "Raising Cain in Cuba." They have been raising Cain in Mexico, also Eleanor. And then Tom Watson, Tom Hardwick and Hoke Smith have been raising Cain in Georgia—lots of it. The crop will be gathered in November.

### G. O. P. MAY LOSE THE SENATE

Information on pretty good authority is to the effect that the Republican party is in danger of losing control of the United States Senate in the November election.

It is significant that Republican politicians made the admission and concede that the Grand Old Party will have to make strenuous endeavors to retain a majority in the Upper House of Congress.

The survey of the Senatorial campaign indicates that the Republican danger is irrespective of whether the party elects its candidate for President.

Since Newberry was convicted of buying his seat in the United States Senate at an outlay of \$180,000 Republican candidates for the Senate will not be so liberal in the purchase of votes. In fact there is a marked decline in the Republican vote market.

### SUGAR COMING DOWN

With the price of sugar coming down all over the United States, the Commissioner of Labor, Ethelbert Steward, says:

"I do not believe there is a chance that prices will go up. If housewives begin to lay in large stocks now, though, it is possible the drop may stop."

"There is, therefore, nothing to be gained by buying in large quantities of sugar now. Housewives should buy only to meet immediate needs."

"Large quantities of sugar are being thrown into the wholesale market by candy dealers."

### WILL HELP HOME INDUSTRIES

An intelligent and progressive Southern writer says that one effect of the Railroad rates will have a tendency to increase manufacturing in the South. He calls attention to the abundance of the people of the South paying freight on raw materials going East and paying freight on the manufactured material when it is returned. He suggests that there are a great many articles for which the raw material is found in South Carolina and other Southern States, material that can be readily manufactured here, though, at this time, they are manufactured in the North and East. The higher the freight rate, the greater the necessity for home industries.

### CHESTERFIELD'S HEALTHY GROWTH

For several years past there has been an alarming tendency throughout the United States toward depopulating the farming districts. The nearby cities, have, accordingly, shown large gains in population. In many rich farming communities in various parts of the country the 1920 census figures show a loss in population. This movement of country people to the crowded cities is generally deplored and, if it should continue will cause direful results, as the cities must be fed by the farms.

The census figures for Chesterfield County prove that this county is an exception to the general rule, as the increase in population during the past ten years is almost equally divided between town and country.

The increase in the entire county for the past ten years is a fraction over 21 per cent. Of this increase the towns have received 25 per cent and the country about 20 per cent.

While the figures cover a period of ten years, it is evident that the growth in the county covers a much shorter time, most of the growth having occurred within the last three or four years. This is due in large measure to the establishment of better country schools, as one of the principal incentives to the farmer to move to town has been to secure better school facilities for his children.

Chesterfield County is essentially a farming community and there is little likelihood of its white population leaving the farm for the town in any large numbers. When good roads are established throughout the county there will be less desire on the part of our country folks to move to town as the automobiles will in a few minutes place them in any town in the county for shopping purposes, and as roads improve so will the country schools be bettered and country children will soon be as well off in this respect as the town children.

### JOIN THE AMERICAN COTTON ASSOCIATION

Chesterfield county should establish a system of "lay-by" schools for adult farmers who do not see the advantages of organization. While illiteracy is being wiped out of the county there are still many of our farmers who either do not believe in organization or at least do not realize its vital importance to them and the rest of us. For the past month the powerful organizations of the manufacturers and their agents have been hammering down the price of cotton. They have succeeded in reducing the market price ten cents. In no other way than by organization could this be possible under the present conditions of the supply and demand. In no other way can the farmer fight these organizations than by organizing themselves. The American Cotton Association is the remedy. It is the only remedy. Every cotton grower and every business man in the county should be members of this great organization. This county is not showing the enthusiasm in the movement that it should.
