Who can hesitate which to choose? That the veil of uncertainty hangs, at last, between us and our future, no one denies. That there is room for doubt as well as hope, we do not gainsay. But the facts, so far, give the preponderance to hope. Looking calmly and impartially upon the probabilities of success or defeat, let us continually bear in mind the wholesome truth, that our doubts but too often

And make us loose the good we oft might By fearing to attempt."
